

1 Information on SMS text messaging and Short Codes

SMS stands for Short Message Service and is commonly referred to as a "text message". Most cell phones support this type of text messaging. Our notification provider, SchoolMessenger, uses a true SMS protocol developed by the telecommunications industry specifically for mass text messaging, referred to as "short code" texting. This method is fast, secure and highly reliable because it is strictly regulated by the wireless carriers and only allows access to approved providers. If you've ever sent a text vote for a TV show to a number like 46999, you have used short code texting.



Despite the outpouring of support from educators, students, and parents—and despite Bell's decision to keep communication accessible for classrooms and communities across Canada—Rogers has no plans to reverse the fee being imposed on Remind text messages on its network.

This forces us to end Remind text notifications for everyone with a Rogers wireless plan (including these subsidiaries) starting today, January 29, at 6pm PT. To keep getting your messages, anyone who has Rogers as their phone carrier will need to enable other notifications on Remind.

To avoid service disruptions, please ask your classes to **download our free app and turn on push notifications**; you can find full instructions in our Help Center, including options for people without smartphones. Text messaging will also continue to be supported for organizations with a Remind School and District plan, which is now available in Canada.

We've updated our Terms of Service to reflect these changes, which you can review on our website here. You can also see specific changes on Github.

Alberta Education Accountability Pillar Survey:

Jan. - Feb. 2019

As an annual check-up on the education system, the Accountability Pillar provides an opportunity for Alberta Education and school authorities to ensure that we are equipping students for success. The Accountability Pillar uses a set of 16 indicators. Data on these indicators consists of surveys of students, parents and teachers on various aspects of education quality, student outcomes such as dropout and high school completion rates, and provincial assessments of student learning. From January to the end of February, Alberta Education will be conducting the annual Accountability Pillar Survey.

- In January, parents of students in grades 8 12 should receive a survey from Alberta Education.
- In February, students in grades 8 12 and all teachers will be completing their surveys online at school.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with your school

Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly.

Survey results will be available to school authorities in May 2019 and will be reported publicly as part of their 3-Year Education Plans and Annual Education Results Reports.

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FROM THE CAREER CENTRE



HELP, I NEED \$\$\$ FOR POST-SECONDARY!

For most of us, the financial commitment to post-secondary education is a major consideration when deciding where to attend and what program to enroll in. The tuition for postsecondary programs can range from a few hundred dollars (\$780 per year for apprenticeship training), to several thousand dollars (\$20,000 per year for Dentistry at the University of Alberta). Tuition for a four-year degree in Alberta is about \$5000 to \$6000 per year. You must also consider other fees as well as living expenses and transportation costs.

How to Pay for Post-Secondary Education

You may cover post-secondary costs in several ways and not all will break your bank.

Scholarships are the best option for paying for some of your post-secondary costs. Some scholarships are based on academic achievement but the vast majority depend on your contribution to your school and community. Be sure to keep track of any volunteer activities you are involved in and if possible ask the organization supervisor for a reference letter.

Many of the post-secondary institutions open their applications for scholarships on December 1. Most require a single application for several scholarships so you are not required to fill in separate applications for each one. Apply for these scholarships as soon as you are able.

Every student is eligible for a Rutherford scholarship if you are able to achieve at least a 75% average in Grades 10, 11 and/or 12. Rutherford Scholarship criteria includes courses such as CTS, Physical Education and many other non-core courses. Do your best to put some Rutherford money in your bank.

Be sure to create a file for yourself that has a copy of your scholarships essay file and any scholarship essays you have written.

you want more information on local scholarships and deadline dates, be sure to get a handout from Mrs. Thompson. Apply for every scholarship for which you qualify. You will be happy you did this when the money starts to roll in!
YOU CAN'T WIN IF YOU DON'T APPLY!

Apprenticeships are another way to pay for your post-secondary education. There are approximately 50 opportunities for apprenticeships in Alberta. Most include technical trades but there are others including baker, cook and hairstylist. An apprentice works for about 1500 hours a year earning a salary and then spends 8 weeks at school. There are several scholarships available for apprentices including a RAP scholarship (\$1000), which can be earned when a student finishes high school. If you are in the RAP program, you will need to apply for this scholarship in the spring of 2019.

Part Time Jobs can add to your pot of money, especially what is earned during breaks and summer holidays. You must ensure the time you need for school is not taken by a part time job while you are in school, so it is necessary to strike a positive balance with the two activities.

Student Loans are a source of money for post-secondary expenses. Ideally, you will borrow only as much as you need to cover what you cannot earn any other way. Student loans are less expensive than bank loans and do not have to be paid back until you are finished your post-secondary program. If you want information on student loans visit the website <u>Student Aid Alberta</u>. See Mrs. Thompson about applying for student loans later in 2019.

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Career Corner

Green Certificate Information:

David Thompson students continue to excel in the Green Certificate Program with 1 completion last fall and 9 more registered this year. Future testing is in Olds on February 11th and 12th and May 13th and 14th. The last test for this school year will be at the end of June.

The Green Certificate courses are open to all students 15 years and older. Students work with a mentor doing practical work as well as book work. Tests are taken orally with qualified testers in Old's or, in the case of Dairy, by Lacombe.

If students wish to take the Green Certificate but do not know a mentor, we can help find one. If interested in this learning opportunity, contact Linda Tomlinson or Norma Thompson at the Career Center by calling the school at 403 729 3930.

Students who are working for an employer, or at home, and are over 15 are eligible to enroll in Work Experience. Contracts are available at the Career Office. Once a contract is signed, students can start counting the hours they work towards credits. A minimum of 125 hours must be worked per contract to receive 5 credits. The maximum that can be received during the course of high school is 30 credits. Marks are based on the employer's evaluation of the student.

Students in Work Experience need to bring in their hours monthly. These hours can be in the form of pay stubs or calendar sheets signed by employers. Extra sheets are available at the Career Center.

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Please Note:


The DTHS office will no longer automatically print receipts for fee payments. If you require a receipt, please contact the school office and we will be happy to send one home with your child.
