FROM THE CAREER CENTRE



All High School Students at DTHS:

As the new school year is well under way, now is the time to consider how you are going to best use your time at school and in the community. Students have some responsibility for organizing and enjoying their educational experience while they are in high school. Consider these suggestions:

- Be sure that you choose courses which will lead to the High School Diploma that best suits your goals. Do not drop courses without seriously weighing the pros and the cons. Consider what courses are needed or even suggested for any post-secondary you might be interested in.
- You need to do what is necessary to successfully complete your high school education
 with a broad selection of courses and done to the best of your ability. Now is not the time
 to let your school work slide. Keep up with assignments and exams and plan ahead for deadlines. Spend extra time on courses that are more difficult for you.

- Consider the options you have in mind for after high school. Whether your plans right now include a trade, a college or university program, or the workforce, you need to be prepared for any change in plans either before you are finished high school or into the future.
- You have a responsibility to create a balance in your life that includes not only a focus on academic studies but also extracurricular activities, community involvement, as well as friends and family.
- Remember that most scholarships are based on your volunteerism and contribution to the community. Take every opportunity to volunteer and to offer assistance with school and community projects. When you are ready scholarships will come your way!

Take advantage of any career field trips we organize for you this year. We will visit Calgary, Edmonton, Olds and Red Deer to check out programs and facilities. Stay tuned for dates and times!

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FROM THE CAREER CENTRE



Grade 12 Students

- If you are in Grade 12, and you plan to attend post-secondary any time in the future, remember that the courses you choose to take this year and the marks you get, count. Diploma exams are particularly important. WORK HARD AND STUDY FOR THESE EXAMS!
- If you are planning to pursue a post-secondary program next year, be sure you have done enough research on programs and institutions, so that you can make wise decisions based on factual information.

- Careers 30 is an important course for all Grade 12 students. Its purpose is to allow
 you to become an expert about opportunities in the workforce and in related postsecondary programs. When you have completed Careers 30 you will be able to make
 informed decisions based on the knowledge you have acquired. You will also know the
 process of applying for post-secondary programs and applying for the many
 scholarships available for all programs.
- Learning a trade is also considered to be a post-secondary program. Some students
 are already enrolled in a trade apprenticeship and are encouraged to make the best
 of the opportunity to start their post-secondary education early. Others need to do
 research in Careers 30 to access the best information possible before they choose a
 trade.
- If you have any questions on academic or career choices and how to achieve your goals, talk to Mrs. Thompson. Together we can choose the best path possible for you!

Career Corner

Work Experience, RAP and the Green Certificate are all off campus courses that move students education out of the school and into the workplace.

Students that are working at home or away, paid or unpaid are eligible for work experience credits if they are 15 years old. Students can pick up a Work Experience contract from the Career Center. The contract must be signed by their employer, parents and themselves before it is returned to the office. The students will then be given a calendar in which to keep track of their hours worked. At the end of each month the employer must sign the calendar then the student will return it to the Career Center.

For every 25 hours worked with one employer, students will receive one credit. The minimum amount of credits given is 5 the maximum is 30. Employers fill out an evaluation which becomes the students mark.

RAP is short for Registered Apprenticeship Program. To qualify for this course students must be 15 years of age and working under a Red Seal Journeyman. Students that are starting in RAP should come to the Career Center and get assistance in registering online from Mrs. Thompson. Employers will then keep track of students hours and of what they have learned. All hours can be used towards hours needed to take the first year apprenticeship schooling.

Credits are determined by the number of hours worked. Mark is determined by the employer.

Green Certificate is a hands on Agricultural Program that allows students 15 years or older to learn while working on the farm or greenhouse. Students along with a mentor sign up for a program in one of the different agricultural streams: cow/calf, field crops, greenhouse, equine, swine, poultry, feedlot, sheep, beekeeping and dairy. Students will receive a large booklet divided into 3 different sections. Each section lists a number of competencies that the student is to learn before testing. Once learned, the student signs up for a testing time through the Career Center. All sections except dairy take place at Olds College. Dairy tests are done by Lacombe.

The testing is in a form of a conversation or demonstrations that takes place between the student and a farmer that is an expert in their field. The tester will give a mark on how well the student has answered the five questions. Students should be working towards testing at this time. The next testing time will be November 18, 2019.

Students will receive 5 or 6 credits for each section for a total of 16 credits.

All students registered in these Off Campus Programs are covered by WCB. All places of work are visited by Linda Tomlinson who completes a mandatory safety form.
