



Student Projects: By Dakota Dickson and Brianna Clay


For our first grade nine science project we were assigned to make a scale of our solar system. It had to include all eight planets, Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune. We designed our project out of a wooden board, nails and clay. Each nail was placed a certain distance from the sun, which would represent an Astronomical Unit (AU). One AU is the distance from the center of the Sun to the center of the Earth. In our project one AU equals one centimeter, in total it was 35 centimeter long. For the clay planets we tried to find similar shades to match the planets color and size. Our project was based off of Nicolaus Copernicus' Heliocentric model, where all the planets rotated around the sun in an elliptical pattern. Throughout this project we have learned the planets in the solar system and the astronomers' contributions on how the planets orbit in space.





On October 22nd students from the Students in Action Group went to WE Day in Edmonton. While at WE Day, students were inspired to make positive changes in our communities, as well as our world, by hearing from world-renowned speakers and award-winning performers. Students also go to hear about the impacts that they have been making themselves by participating in the Students in Action Group at DTHS.

Distance Education News




It is always good to see students who are taking the distance education option to be progressing in their courses. This term is one-third over which means that students should have completed at least one-third of their material to be finished by the end of January.



Our school's nutrition program is proudly funded by Breakfast for Learning. Thanks to their support, we are able to offer our students a healthy meal or snack during the school day.


Breakfast for Learning is a national charity that is committed to ensuring students attend school well nourished and ready to learn, giving them the best chance of success in life.
